
Ultimately one team emerged victorious!

#### Hono Hono Care



Were you one of the lucky ones who got a Dendrobium Anosmum (commonly called a Hono Hono in Hawaii) at our GIOS Holiday Party? If so, right about now their stems should be transitioning from having beautiful, lush green alternating leaves, to leaves that yellow, brown and drop, making the stems barren. The orchid's energy is redirecting to their pseudobulbs.



For Hono Honos, December through February is their dormant cycle when the temperature drops. Dormancy is a time for rest and restoration before buds begin to appear in March and April, and begin to bloom in April and May. Without a proper dormant period, flowering is poor due to the competition of energy and growth between the buds and the leaves.

The dormancy period is not the time to replant, repot, fertilize, expose to high temperatures or full sun, nor to "overwater." Now is the time to stop all fertilization and cut back on the water they receive. Stop applying liquid fertilizer and remove any extra time release fertilizer remaining in the media.

Monitor the water they receive. Hono Hono should receive water one to three times each week (depending on exposure to humidity and the extent of, or saturation from, watering). If they are outside, move or protect them from excess rain or supplement a lack of rainfall with clean water up to three times each week. It's important to ensure that the Hono Hono roots and media are dry between waterings, and that there is ample air circulation.

Hono Honos typically flower in March, April and May. Bud sprouts begin to emerge on alternate sides of the stems. Treat for any pests or diseases with insecticides and/or fungicides. Increase the frequency of watering to once daily when the buds are large and begin to open. New stem shoots will begin to grow at the base of the budding and flowering stems. Keep the roots moist when new canes emerge to enhance the health of the pseudobulb and longevity of next year's blooms.



We hope you are successful caring for your Hono Hono and getting lots of blooms. We are hoping that you will then bring your blooming orchid to the Spring Show for the display!
